2005 National Jamboree
(for detailed information, see the *Troop Leader Guide*, pages 29-31

(updated March 6, 2005)

Provided by Council for each Scout:

1. Day Pack
2. Duffel Bag
3. Two Jamboree emblems for Class A uniforms (worn above right pocket)
(one distributed to each registered Scout in December and a second in the spring)
4. Two Troop patches to replace the Greater St. Louis Area Council patch on left shoulder
(distributed at the April 23 Activity Day)
5. One complete set of the Council's Jamboree patches (distributed at the April 23 Activity Day)
6. Name tag (distributed the day we board the busses)
7. 2005 National Jamboree neckerchief as a souvenir (distributed at the Jamboree by National)

Provided by the Jamboree Troop for each Scout:

1. Troop baseball cap in troop color
Troop 1235 – Royal Blue
Troop 1236 – Navy
Troop 1237 – Yellow
Troop 1238 – Red
Troop 1239 - Black
2. Troop Jamboree neckerchief in troop color
3. Troop Jamboree neckerchief slide
4. Troop Jamboree T-shirts (if the Troop Committee decides to provide)
5. Patrol Patch for right sleeve

Provided by the Council for each Troop:

1. Twenty-one two-person tents with poles and pegs (18 tents for 36 Scouts, one for the Scoutmaster, one for the Quartermaster, and one for the ASM Program and ASM Scribe) Note: the adult tents are larger than the Scout tents.
2. Six Dining flies with poles and pegs (one per patrol and two for leaders & PLC)
3. Four patrol food boxes
4. Four aluminum griddles
5. Four chef's outfit (ten disposable aprons, 2-pairs hot pot tongs, 2-pairs mittens)
6. Eight sets (two per patrol) of eating gear (fork, knife, spoon) for guests
7. One U.S. Flag with flagstaff (8 foot with emblem)
8. One Troop flag
9. One flag-carrying sling
10. Six picnic tables (one per patrol, two for leaders and PLC)
11. Basic Troop Equipment (BTE) Package – One Package per Troop

One No. 27100 Troop Tool Kit

4 hammers, 1 adjustable wrench, 1 screwdriver, 4 markers, 1 pliers, assorted nails, roll of light wire, ball of light cord, thumbtacks, bow saw with extra blade)

One No. 01231 Water Carrier

One No. 27084 Laundry Bucket
One No. 27087 Table Cover
One No. 27090 Lantern with battery
One No. 01050 twenty-cup coffee/cocoa pot
One No. 28320 Water cooler, three gallons

12. Basic Patrol Equipment (BPE) - One Package per patrol

One No. 27200 Kitchen Kit
Two No. 01231 Water Carriers
One No. 01153 Chef's Tool Kit (per page 30 in the Jamboree Troop Leader Guide)
(contains one carving knife, one large spoon, one large fork, one ladle, one paring knife, one steam pan, one pancake turner or spatula, one potato peeler, one mechanical can opener)
One No. 27084 Laundry Bucket
One No. 01011 Trail Chef Cook Kit (per page 30 in the Jamboree Troop Leader Guide)
(contains four pots, two frying pans, ten cups, ten plates, ten bowls)
One No. 01092 Camper's First Aid Kit
One No. 27085 Propane Stove Package
One No. 27087 Table Cover
Five No. 27088 Containers 20 oz.
Two No. 01215 Hot Pot Tongs
Two No. 27089 Pitcher/Decanter 64 oz
One No. 28320 Water Cooler, three gallons

Suggested additional equipment provided by Troop Committee for each Troop:

1. Additions to the No. 01092 Camper's First Aid Kit as recommended by Drs. John Weltmer and David Dye (we will provide a list on a future update)
2. Four patrol flags made by the Scouts on staves
3. Four Patrol repair kits
Each kit should contain sharpening stone, string, thin wire, needles, thread, safety pins.
4. Four sugar dispensers (one per patrol)
5. Four sets of salt and pepper shakers (one set per patrol)
6. Four laundry buckets (one per patrol) for washing clothes with toilet plunger per bucket (use this for soapy water). In the past we have found that large plastic 5-gallon paint buckets work as the soapy laundry bucket. Clean water washing can be done in the buckets provided in the Basic Patrol Equipment Package (No. 27084 above)
7. Four waterproof match containers with matches (one per patrol)
8. Eight large aluminum pots for heating water
Following the three-pot method of washing dishes, we need two additional aluminum pots per patrol (one with warm water and soap, one with clear hot water, one with sanitizer tablets). The third aluminum pot is in the Basic Patrol Equipment Package.
9. Eight scouring pads (two per patrol) or copper wire with soap-processed cleaning cloth
10. Liquid dish detergent for patrols
11. Handi Wipes for patrols
12. Paper towels for patrols
13. Extra garbage bags for patrols

Note: Containing garbage inside the troop camp site can become a problem. We can help the Scouts by providing large heavy-duty black plastic bags from the grocery store. After each meal, the troop trash bag must be removed from the troop campsite. ASM-Quartermasters and the Troop Quartermaster will provide oversight on maintaining a clean troop campsite.

14. Aluminum foil, heavy duty for each patrol
15. A roll of plastic for table clothes
16. Plastic sheet for air-drying dishes
17. Four 3-inch kitchen funnels
18. Four fruit juice can openers (an opener with a triangular-shaped head for punching an opening in the top of a can)
19. Troop bulletin board (posted at the gateway for: (1) tracking progress on earning all the Activity segments, (2) Scouts to show who their buddies are during the day at the jamboree, and (3) troop announcements.
20. Lanterns for patrols with extra batteries (note, there is only one troop lantern provided in the Basic Troop Equipment package)
21. Materials for gateways
Note: Study Appendix Q in the Troop Leader Guide Book on "guy wire detail" to ensure your gateway is secure and will not tip over under high winds.
22. Additions to Troop repair kit (screwdrivers, pliers, duct tape, bow saw, tent repair materials like sealer, light wire, cord, etc.)
23. Eight "Jamboards" (two per patrol) for the propane stoves (see Troop Leader Guide, Appendix U on page 86). Two "jamboards" are made from one five-foot, one inch by four inch pine board. The jamboards hold the two propane stoves together and prevent them from tipping over. Drill holes per Appendix U.

Issues to be resolved:

1. Two stands per patrol for the propane stoves are needed. We will check with Pat Martchink and see what can be borrowed from camping supplies.
